Whether they're known as Giving Trees or Angel Trees, for more than a decade, each district school has come up with a way to help meet the needs of students during the holidays and throughout the year. This year the schools were overwhelmed by the community's generosity, and successfully collected hundreds of gifts for 130 students.

"We always worry about there being enough," said Courtney Dobkins, who, along with Robin Sullivan and Meredith Grizzaffi, help spearhead the High School's Giving Tree efforts. "This year, since we had to start later and without our usual fundraising, we were even more concerned."

Sullivan, who organizes a year-round pantry program at the high school, said she's also seen the numbers of students with food insecurity escalate. as a result of the pandemic.

"We are so happy to be able to spoil them this year," said Dobkins, noting that organizers made quick work of some lengthy wish lists.

Jackie Purificato is a sixth grade special education teacher who has helped organize the Middle School's annual holiday gift drive since 2016. She says students typically select gifts they wish to give from a tree in the lobby.

Because of Covid precautions, Purificato said, the Middle School wish list went directly online. An Amazon gift registry made the process simple and easy but she worried that some of the holiday spirit might be lost.

"We thought we might have to bypass the kids selecting from the tree, but I have heard from kids that their parents included them in the selection, purchasing and wrapping."

Amy Stephenson, Primary counselor, said 50 students from 20 families benefitted

from the Giving Tree this year, adding they also received help from local law enforcement agencies.

"The Columbia County Sheriff's Office was able to secure a donation of American Girl Dolls and soccer balls, to help augment Giving Tree gifts," she said.

"The State Police in Livingston reached out to me a few weeks ago and asked if I wanted to pick out some toys from their toy drive. I was able to drive down there last week and pick out a few things," said Stephenson.

Survey Responses Guide Planning

District surveys show confidence, areas for growth

In November, Ichabod Crane administered three surveys district wide and received responses from 895 parents, and approximately 53 percent of students in grade 4-12 ; as well as 78 percent of staff. The survey looked at four key areas aligned with the BOE priorities: Health and Safety, Academics, Equity in Technology and Social Emotional Well-Being.

Survey results were summarized in two Board of Education meetings in December, which can be found on the [BOE website](#).

Parents surveyed were overwhelmingly positive with respect to Health and Safety, with approximately 90 percent responding they felt well-informed and confident in the district's planning and implementation of around safety procedures.

Parents also showed a strong level of confidence when asked about how well their child has adjusted to this unique school year; the level of importance the school places on social emotional well-being; the quality of the counseling and other mental health resources provided to student and families to help with their social emotional needs. Students and staff also reported a new-found comfort level with technology platforms to teach and learn remotely, and almost all reported they have the technology at home to access remote learning.

These are huge improvements from March when we were forced to shift to remote learning with no advanced warning.

However, while students overwhelmingly report a comfort level and ability to learn remotely, teacher and parent results indicate concerns in this area. As a result, we continue to focus on the level of engagement and thoroughness of the remote instruction for both fully remote and quarantined students. [See survey results here](#).

"Remote learning is new for students, teachers, and families and we are working hard to continually improve the experience for everyone. We are offering ongoing training for teachers, and in response to feedback from teachers and parents, continue to refine expectations and support for students," said Lucas Christensen, assistant superintendent of schools.
