ICHABOD CRANE CARES:

Supporting the Whole Student

The staff at ICC know the importance of educating and supporting each of our approximately 1,700 students in our district, and we accomplish this on a daily basis by taking a holistic approach to ensure our students continue to learn and thrive in safe and supportive environments.

"We know that we cannot simply focus on academic achievement and interventions. We also have to focus on our students' social-emotional brain development," Superintendent Suzanne Guntlow said. "This approach allows our educators to teach more effectively, our students to learn better, and our parents and community to feel pride in a shared commitment to our entire Rider student body."

Educating and supporting the whole child at Ichabod Crane is accomplished in many different ways. Some examples include having a team of AIS (Academic Intervention Services) educators, who are NYS certified teachers that are trained to work with students K-12 who need direct support. We also continue to offer a robust afterschool and summer learning and

enrichment programs across all grades.

Our experienced K-12 Counseling Department's psychologists, school counselors and a full-time social worker support our students emotionally, academically and socially. This includes, but is not limited to, 1:1 counseling by a licensed master social worker, crisis intervention, and referrals to necessary out-of-district services and supports.

The district also has a web of safety net programs called Ichabod Cares. We have created and sustained an array of programs to help our Rider students and families whenever necessary. We have programs that distribute food, clothing, shoes and toiletries on a weekly basis, which include the Primary School and Middle School BackPack programs and Ichabod's Table and Closet at the High school.

Next year's proposed budget supports maintaining staff and programs, as well as hiring a new occupational therapist, the addition of one special education classroom at the Middle School and additional tutoring services.

Continued Investment in our Global Community of Learners

Investing in high-quality, state-of-the-art technologies continues to be a top priority at Ichabod Crane CSD. Once again, district officials have proposed a budget that supports the necessary maintenance and acquisition of new devices to ensure our students and staff continue to be part of the global community of learners.

"Technology allows our staff to remove the physical barriers of the classroom," Superintendent Suzanne Guntlow said. "Through the use of devices like Chromebooks, our students can connect their classroom lessons to the real world around them. Technology also allows our administrators and staff to collect a multitude of data, which allows for more effective, differentiated and individualized instruction."

In 2022, we achieved our goal of being fully 1:1, which means that every ICC student has a district-issued Chromebook. In the 2023-24 proposed budget, we are replacing a third of our Chromebooks as they approach the end of their usable life.

Another way we connect to the world is through the use of internet-connected, projection-based display systems in each classroom. Next year's budget supports new equipment in the Primary and Middle Schools, following in the footsteps of the High School that received 36 new display systems in the 2022-23 school year. We also continue to offer distance learning, which provides our students access to virtual offerings they would not have otherwise.

We also purchase and use online learning programs and software designed to support teachers' use of individual student data to drive their classroom instruction. One example of this is i-Ready, an online program for reading and math that we continue to fund in next year's budget. i-Ready consists of two parts: diagnostic and personalized instruction.



Each year, students in grades K-8 take three diagnostic assessments in September, January and May. Our educators use the assessment data to individualize instruction for their students. The assessments also allow teachers and administrators to monitor progress throughout the school year. In addition, i-Ready offers personalized online lessons that are informed by the assessments.

"This technology is absolutely not a replacement for a highly-skilled teacher," Asst. Superintendent Lucas Christensen said. "It is a platform to help our teachers with differentiated instruction, which means our educators adapt what they are teaching to meet the needs of their students in as close to real-time as possible. One way we identify those needs is through the use of programs like i-Ready."

Excelling in Academics and Athletics

STEAM-POWERED:

The Capital Project Accelerates Collaboration

Eight months have passed since the completion of the multi-year, multi-phase Capital Project, which involved a series of complex renovations and construction, and the addition of cutting-edge technology and equipment across the ICC campus.

As a result, the district has added new courses, increased multidisciplinary collaborations, utilized the brand-new pre-

miere Middle School gymnasium in many ways, relied on solar energy to power the three-building campus, and much more.

"These spaces and new equipment have not sat idle," Superintendent Suzanne Guntlow said. "Since the very beginning of the school year, our staff and students have utilized the final products of the Capital Project in many innovative ways. It is amazing to see what we have been able to do and accomplish in less than a year's time."

As they have settled into the new

STEAM wing, High School staff and students have collaborated more between departments as they explore new ways to solve problems and explore ideas. The High School also added new courses, including Automotive I, a full-year course; and Materials Processing/Production, a half-year metals course.

"These courses have allowed students to explore automobiles and repair, and metalwork and design in ways that weren't possible before the new wing, and next year, we will have even more to offer," HS Principal Craig Shull said. "We are also looking forward to continuing our conversations with Columbia-Greene Community College about future budding partnerships related to the STEAM wing."

The 2023-24 proposed budget supports the addition of Advanced Materials Processing and Machining, the next course in the metals sequence. In addition, the High School will offer Robotics and Beginner Programming. This course

will use pneumatic and digitally-controlled systems to create robotic arms and rovers that can accomplish specific tasks. Students will learn how to write code to program and remotely control a robot.

At the Middle School, the former gymnasium was gutted to make way for the new, enlarged space. This year, the gymnasium is being used to host many athletic competitions at all levels, including basketball, volleyball and wrestling; all-school assemblies; and open houses. Community

sports organizations, such as the Kinderhook Basketball Association and Northern Columbia Little League, have used the gym for practices.

"It was an honor to compete in the new gymnasium during my last season as a Rider basketball player. By creating this new, enlarged space, it felt like the district had our back," said Alex Schmidt, an ICC senior who recently committed to play basketball at SUNY Polytechnic Institute in Utica. "We celebrated our state championship by hanging our banner in the new gym, which for me, symbolized our team reaching our ultimate goal."



ARTS IN EDUCATION

Finding new and different ways of integrating the arts into what we offer at ICC continues to be a key focus, as we recognize the long-term impact it has on learning, providing our students with new pathways to learn more effectively and participate more meaningfully.

One way we support the arts is by participating in Questar III's Arts in Education program, which provides the district access to a comprehensive online directory that lists 600+ performers, institutions and programs that are aligned with state standards.

This year, through Arts in Education, we funded Flying Deer, our popular K-4 program that provides our students with many opportunities to engage in nature-based lessons and activities. Arts in Education also allowed us to bring artist and educator Sasha Sicurella back to our Middle School, where she offered a series of art-based workshops for our fifth graders focused on self and global awareness. Next year's proposed budget supports increased utilization of Arts in Education.


ICC's Continued Capstone Achievement

The Ichabod Crane High School Class of 2022 once again met the district's target, with 96 percent of the class earning diplomas in four years. The school district established the Riders' Pathway initiative in 2018, which established a graduation rate target of 95 percent or better. The school district has met or exceeded this rate every year since, including the past three years despite the challenges of the pandemic.

The Riders' Pathway to Success is a collaborative effort by the school district's teachers and administrators across all schools and content areas to set goals, monitor progress and develop specific actions to support any areas in need of improvement. This group meets quarterly and has been instrumental in several innovations designed to support student success and growth.

Rooted in the Science of Reading

In recent years, ICC leadership has used the "Science of Reading," a vast, interdisciplinary body of scientifically-based research, as its roadmap to guide very deliberate efforts to improve literacy instruction throughout the district.


This research directed our selection of new professional development programs, election of the new K-3 literacy program, and now, the same exhaustive process for the planned adoption of a new 4-6 literacy program this June.

In the 2021-22 school year, a small group of K-3 staff first trained in LETRS, Language Essential for Reading and Spelling – a professional-learning program that instructs teachers in what literacy skills need to be taught, why, and

how to plan to teach them – and it delves into the research behind these evidence-based practices. The following year, all Primary School staff trained in LETRS.

"We recognize that high-quality, research-based professional development is a critical component to maintaining and improving our literacy instruction," said Asst. Superintendent Lucas Christensen, who oversees all curriculum programs. "I am grateful for our staff's hard work and commitment to ensure that our youngest students receive the foundational skills they need for word reading and language comprehension."

In spring 2022, we chose CKLA (Core Knowledge Language Arts) as the new core reading program at the Primary School, after a group of ICC K-6 literacy experts met for months and solicited input from area districts and specialists.



Implementation began in September 2022, with continued professional development and the creation of a literacy coach position to support the rollout of CKLA. With less than a year into the new program, PS staff are already reporting positive results.

Currently, our district leadership and literacy experts are repeating the same research-based process to select a new 4-6 literacy program. Our elementary teachers are training in LETRS, while another internal expert group works to ultimately adopt a new program in June, with implementation in September. Like with CKLA, the 4-6 implementation will include teacher training, curriculum work and ongoing support provided by our lit-

eracy coach during the 2023-24 school year. The district's literacy work also happened in consultation with education experts at the University of Albany.

Next year's proposed budget includes funding for the retention of the literacy coach position, ongoing professional development across K-6, and a new 4-6 literacy program rooted in research and adherence to NYS standards.


"I am proud to work with teachers and administrators who continuously educate and inform themselves on the evidence-based research on best practices in literacy education," said Berit Erickson, the district's literacy coach. "And then based on that, they have made informed decisions and continue to have informed discussions and professional development about the shift in reading philosophies."



VOTER INFORMATION

VOTER ELIGIBILITY

You are eligible to vote if you are a U.S. citizen, 18 years old or older and a resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote.

VOTER REGISTRATION

You must be registered before you are permitted to vote. You are already registered if you have:

- Voted in a school election within the last four (4) years
- Voted in a general election from the address in the District within the last four (4) years

Individuals may register to vote with the District Clerk from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m. on school days at the office of the District Clerk in the Central Office of the School District. An individual must be registered at least five days preceding an election in order to vote in that election.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Absentee ballots are available to any registered voter in the district.

Residents who will be out of town or unable to vote in person because of illness or disability may request an absentee ballot. Applications for absentee ballots must be received at the office of the School District Clerk by May 9, 2023, if the ballot is to be mailed to voter or by May 15, 2023 if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. Completed absentee ballots must be received by the School District Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on May 16, 2023.

A contingency budget would restrict tax levy revenue to maximum allowable from 2022-23. Under a contingent budget the district would have to consider program reductions, including layoffs to both instructional and non-instructional staff. There would also be possible reductions of all program areas including extra-curricular activities. No equipment could be purchased unless it was a direct safety concern. Finally, the district would be required to charge all outside community groups for the use of facilities and grounds.
